9.30am Steel City: Kelham Island Museum

Kelham Island Museum was built in 1982 and has long been an ERIH anchor point. Situated on a 900-yearold island in the heart of the city's industrial districts, the museum shares the fascinating stories of Sheffield's heavy and light industries.

In engaging interactive galleries, discover how steelmaking transformed Sheffield and the world. Delegates will be given the chance to witness the 12,000hp might of the River Don Engine - the most powerful steam engine in operation in Europe.





A once thriving ironworking and coal-mining village, Elsecar includes the remains of major collieries and ironworks, colliery workshops, an industrial canal and reservoir, steam railway, miners' cottages dating back to the 1790s and more. The village has been awarded ERIH anchor-point status in 2014.

Elsecar is home to the last Newcomen Beam Engine still in its original location, anywhere in the world. Built in 1795, the engine, its engine-house and 40-metre mineshaft are undergoing a major conservation project, which will be nearing completion during the visit. Guests will be given close-up access to the engine, guided by the team who have led its conservation.

2.00pm Underground Tour: National Coal-Mining Museum of England

The National Coal-Mining Museum of England was first opened as the Yorkshire Mining Museum in 1988 and was given national status in 1995. It became an ERIH anchor point in 2004.

Go 140 metres underground with mining veterans during a special hour-long tour of one the oldest mines in Britain. Above ground, delegates will be able to explore museum galleries and discover an impressive collection that spans centuries of coal-mining technology.
