The interpretive display in The Heritage Hub at Carnlough Town Hall also celebrates Carnlough's harbour, its maritime connections, the area's beautiful scenery, geology, wildlife and natural resources. The Town Hall, harbour, railway system and hotel were built in the 1850s by the Marchioness of Londonderry, Frances Anne Vane Tempest, as an important part of the infrastructure servicing the growth of the limestone industry in Carnlough.

Facilities include victorian dress up for children, hands on learning, film, presentation, light refreshments, lift, full wheelchair accessibility. Welcoming local volunteer guides.

Approaching Glenarm, one's attention is drawn to the white rocks along the Coast Road which are visible on the headlands and in the construction of the limestone harbour and marina. The valuable cretaceous limestone has been quarried at Glenarm since 1850 and used for industrial smelting during the 19th Century.

Today, Glenarm's quarrying has developed from pickaxes, waterwheels, explosives and white dust into a high techcomputerised process discretely mined and filtered. Glenarm still retains its wonderful octagonal brick chimney with iron banding, a landmark site, at the entrance to the Village and its layde water-way is now a garden walk with views across the Glen.
